Every July 4th for 250 years, as a country, we've collectively celebrated the courage to dream of a better future and the collective effort needed to build it.

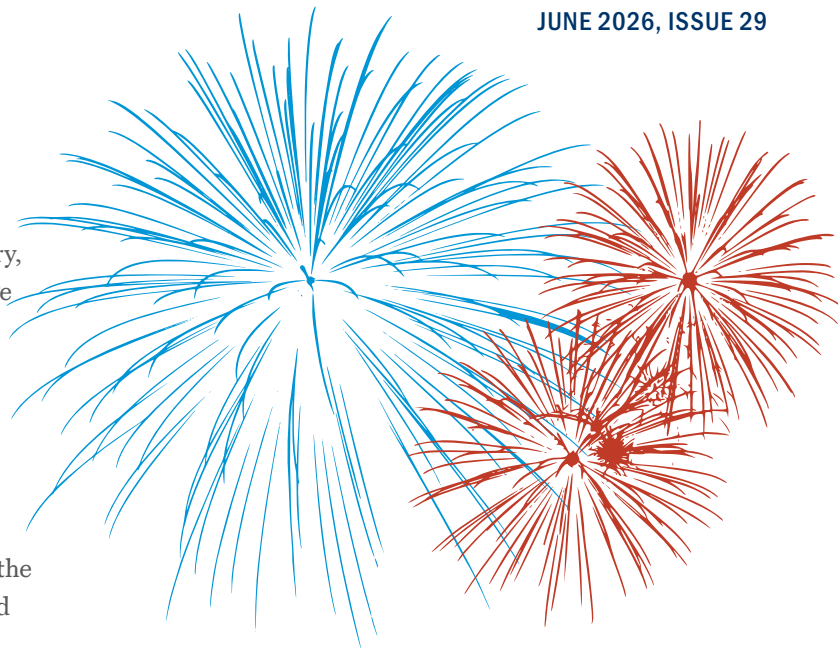
Over the holiday weekend while celebrating our country's 250th anniversary, I found myself reflecting

that happen. Here's a look at just some of what's happening around the Health System that you'll see in this issue:

- **St. Vincent Charity Health & Healing Hub** – Goodwill recently launched a \$40 million campaign to build a 60,000–80,000 sq. ft. Opportunity Center on the Hub in Cleveland's Central neighborhood. The Goodwill Opportunity Center will be anchored by a large grocery store, and bring multiple nonprofit services under one roof.
- **Foundation grants** – Since relaunching a few months ago, the **Sisters of Charity Foundation of Cleveland** made its first grants of 2026 by naming 36 recipients of the inaugural Hines Trust Nursing Grants program. The program awards \$5,000 annual grants for continuing education in the nursing profession. The **Sisters of Charity Foundation of Canton** announced \$632,127 in Q1 and Q2 Grants, which were awarded to multiple organizations that address the needs of the poor and underserved.

◆ **SISTERS OF CHARITY FOUNDATION OF CLEVELAND: Hines Trust Grant Recipients Recognized at Prayer Service** – Recipients of the inaugural Hines Trust Nursing Grants program were recognized at the CSA 175th Anniversary Prayer Service in Cleveland in May. ◆ **ST. VINCENT CHARITY HEALTH & HEALING HUB: Goodwill Launches Opportunity Center Fundraising Campaign** — Momentum continues to build, especially with Goodwill’s recent launch of a \$40 million campaign to build a 60,000–80,000 sq. ft. Opportunity Center on the Hub in Cleveland’s Central neighborhood. Through a partnership with Goodwill Industries of Greater Cleveland and East Central Ohio, Inc., the Center will be a one-stop hub for employment services, career programming, groceries, nonprofit partners, and more. The Goodwill Opportunity Center will be anchored by a large grocery store, and bring multiple nonprofit services under one roof. It’s a model working in Canton, where the Goodwill Ken Weber Community Campus opened in 2010. Now it serves over 70,000 community members each year.

◆ **CLEVELAND CENTRAL PROMISE NEIGHBORHOOD— Pathways to Purpose Summer Experience Kicks Off** — Running June 15 to July 24, the Pathways to Purpose program is providing structured academic enrichment, workforce exposure, mentorship, creative expression and family engagement to youth ages 5-18 who live in Cleveland’s Central neighborhood or attend school there. The initiative is designed to reduce summer learning loss, increase workforce readiness, strengthen social-emotional skills, and connect youth to trusted adults and positive community resources.



◆ **JOSEPH & MARY’S HOME: Renovare Shares Documentary Songwriting Work with Residents** — A visit from Renovare is always a special day at Joseph & Mary’s Home. The music ensemble exudes warmth, peace and understanding. 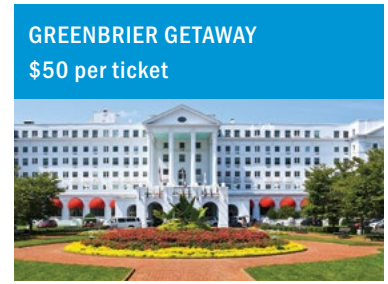

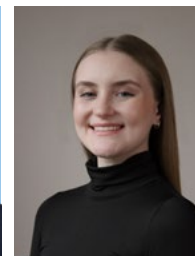

**Celebrating 30 Years through Service** – As mentioned last month, the Sisters of Charity Foundation of Canton has chosen to honor its 30th anniversary milestone by volunteering and giving back in a way that reflects both the mission and the legacy of the Sisters of Charity of St. Augustine. **Advocating for Young Children and Families in Columbus** — ECRC staff recently joined nearly 300 parents, caregivers, children and advocates at the Ohio Statehouse in Columbus for the annual Family Voices at the Statehouse event organized by Groundwork Ohio. Families had the chance to share their experiences directly with state and federal policymakers, highlighting both the challenges and opportunities facing Ohio’s youngest children. Conversations focused on issues affecting families every day, including access to affordable child care, housing and food security, maternal mental health, and creating healthy environments where children can thrive. Family Voices at the Statehouse also underscored the importance of investing in young children and families as a strategy for strengthening Ohio’s workforce, communities and economy for generations to come. Strengthening early learning and supporting families requires more than direct services; it also requires elevating the voices of those most impacted. Advocacy is a key part

of the ECRC mission, helping ensure that policies reflect the real needs of children, families and the early childhood professionals who serve them every day. Thank you to Groundwork Ohio for organizing this important opportunity and to the nearly 50 policymakers and staff members who took the time to listen and engage in meaningful conversations about issues that matter most to Ohio families.

◆ **SISTERS OF CHARITY FOUNDATION OF SOUTH CAROLINA: In-Person Health Care Systems Change Initiative Kicks Off** – The Foundation held the first in-person session of its Health Care Systems Change Initiative in May. Funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Foundation, this three-year initiative supports local organizations working to address systemic health inequities in South Carolina with financial resources, technical assistance and a co-created cohort model of participation. This first session included relationship building among cohort participants, followed by advocacy readiness exercises and learning led by a health policy subject matter expert. Future sessions will build on this learning to increase the organizations’ health equity advocacy capacity. Organizations participating in the cohort are Allendale County HEALing Partners, Bamberg County HEALing Partners, Barnwell County HEALing Partners, Lowcountry Legal Volunteers and the Family Solutions Education Initiative at the South Carolina Office of Rural Health.

◆ **SOUTH CAROLINA CENTER FOR FATHERS AND FAMILIES (SCCFF): Karriem Edwards Honored as Black Nonprofit Leader of the Year** – Together SC’s Black Nonprofit Leaders Forum named Karriem Edwards, SCCFF president, the 2026 Joyce Gillespie Ford Black Nonprofit Leader of the Year. Presented annually, the award celebrates a Black nonprofit leader who demonstrates exceptional leadership, service and dedication to their community. Karriem was selected for his strategic, mission-driven leadership and his commitment to improving the lives of fathers, children and families throughout South Carolina.

Karriem accepted the recognition in a recent LinkedIn post and credited his team for the achievement. “True leadership isn’t about a single person; it’s about building a shared vision,” he wrote. “While my name is on this award, it truly belongs to our entire team. I want to salute my incredible ‘Pit Crew.’ Thank you for going above and beyond every single day to serve more dads better. This recognition is yours.” Under his leadership, SCCFF has reported

The recognition highlights the collaborative approach Karriem has championed under the banner “Serve More Dads Better.”

**Forging Strong Fathers and Families Month** – June is like Christmas at SCCFF because fathers are elevated through its outreach events and media distribution. The annual fatherhood proclamation campaign, a four-month effort, culminates in June with speaking opportunities at monthly county councils in more than half the state, along with several cities, including the state capital, Columbia. These 33 proclamations in 2026 are opportunities to build relationships in each community and will help build capacity for reaching more fathers and their families. In addition to the proclamations in June, SCCFF has released fatherhood PSAs featuring notable South Carolina men. These 60-second reflections on “forging strong fathers” share stories encouraging fathers across the state to be present and engaged. Participants included USC Gamecocks coach **Shane Beamer**, Senator **Tim Scott**, USC President Emeritus **Harris Pastides**, Colonial Life CEO **Tim Arnold**, former Detroit Tigers catcher **Grayson Greiner**, former NFL fullback **Patrick DiMarco** and business leader **Matt Vaadi**.

**Bringing Hope to Hampton County** – Hampton County again honored SCCFF on June 8 with its annual fatherhood proclamation and received a commitment from all three South Carolina organizations that Hampton would become a focus of health and healing ministry in a concerted effort. With the combined efforts of SCCFF, Healthy Learners and the Sisters of Charity Foundation of South Carolina, the families of Hampton County will be increasingly strengthened and sustained in 2026.
